Items used more than once throughout the curriculum will be **bolded** to indicate they are used in more than one project. This list includes materials for the **entire year**, many of which you might find around the house, so cross out any items you currently own. Don't let the size of this list overwhelm you as there are many ways to substitute items with things you currently own.

Construction paper
☐ Writing notebooks (Channie's notebooks are great for beginning writers or writers who need
assistance with spacing and alignment. The pages can be pulled out, cut, and pasted onto projects as
well.)

🖒 Glue (sticks, clear liquid, and hot)
🗅 Yarn or embroidery thread
Paints & inks (solid and liquid watercolors, oil pastels, acrylics or tempera) & paint brushes
Paint palette (a piece of Plexiglas or egg carton will work as well)
Colored pencils, crayons, or markers + 1 black permanent marker
🗅 Pipe cleaners
🖒 Glitter or sequins
🖒 Variety of felt squares
Pencils (We recommend My First Ticonderoga #2. Tip: Carefully cut them down to smaller size with a
knife for better control. Use the small leftovers as "game pencils.")
Small individual dry-erase boards with writing lines, markers, and eraser (Small children tend to
enjoy the novelty of writing with these colored markers. The thickness of the markers help with grip and the ease of erasing makes correcting mistakes a cinch. It is also a great paper saver, with no stacks of
paper to organize. If you care to save work completed on the board, simply take a photo.)

Counters (small toys, wooden coins from a craft shop, felted acorns, etc.)
